### **Course Description:**

English 120 develops <u>expository</u>, narrative, and <u>argumentative</u> writing based on reading and analysis of essays and other college-level texts. The course emphasizes <u>critical thinking and reasoned</u> support of ideas and reinforces the connections between reading and writing. Instruction includes a focus on research practices, evaluating sources, and proper citation and <u>documentation</u>. A minimum of 6,000 to 8,000 words of writing is required.

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- Think, read, and write critically about a variety of ethical, civic, and cultural topics.
- Write unified, coherent, well supported, and grammatically correct documents
  while also demonstrating adequate research skills, including locating, evaluating,
  integrating, and documenting sources using discipline appropriate styles, such as
  MLA.

## **In-Person Requirements:**

You are required to attend class in room 1434 each Monday from 9:30-11:20am for the entire semester (1/18/23 - 5/27/23) except during spring break) or you will be marked absent. Listen to my welcome video in Canvas regarding Zoom options to attend class remotely in case you need to.

## **Online Requirements:**

At least three times a week, you'll need to check for new messages, postings, assignments, and announcements. It is easy to forget, so make a schedule when you will do so. The Canvas system records when, where, and how long you are in the class environment. You may be dropped if you miss a week of checking in to your class or get too behind in your work. You will find the assignments by week on the home page by clicking on "Weekly Schedule: Start Here." You can also click on Modules to see each week as it appears. You can always go back to the previous weeks if you need to. You can also check your scores, current grade, and my written feedback in "My Grades."

#### **Course Requirements:**

Final drafts of essay assignments must be typed, double-spaced and <u>MLA formatted</u>. Papers must include one-inch margins and must have page numbers. Each student must also submit rough drafts periodically for peer review. Students must submit other assignments related to final drafts of essays.

The number one reason students fail a hybrid/online course is that they do not have or take the time to complete the assignments on deadline due to poor time management. In Week 1 in Canvas, I have created a time management exercise to help you and to receive credit.

Each student is responsible for the assigned readings and/or activities. **Reading passages** assigned for a particular week should be read before writing response papers.

Assignments are due up to the end **time given** on indicated days; this will usually be just before midnight. Pay close attention to all due dates/times as they may change. **Late assignments receive an automatic deduction of 10% each day they are late (which means a below passing score after 4 days).** 

Plagiarism, whether intentional or accidental, is an offense punishable by failure of this course. You will be required to also submit your essays to turnitin for plagiarism review. You may not submit essays you used for other classes.

Having someone extensively edit and revise your writing is also dishonest and a form of plagiarism. All essays must contain the student's original work, or else they must be scrupulously documented/cited. Any student who turns in an essay that is plagiarized will be subject to the Napa Valley College's <u>Academic Honesty Policy</u>. You will be flunked from the course.

**Note:** Failure to complete an assignment will significantly affect your grade as it results in a loss of 100 to 200 points each. You will not pass the class if you miss any of the major writing assignments. In an online course, other, smaller assignments add up and count as your participation and replacement for the face to face in-class activity—**do not** neglect these smaller assignments as they will possibly drop your grade and/or cause you to fail.

- <u>Harassment of any kind</u> (implied, written, oral or physical) toward any member of the class or the instructor will not be tolerated.
- You are urged to contact me via email at any time, particularly if you have a question or would like feedback on an essay. ALL emails I receive will be answered within 48 hours. Do not wait until the last minute for help.

## **How to Cope When Your Computer Breaks:**

Have a back up in place! You can access the class and textbook sites on as many computers as you like via a normal web browser and you should always have extra copies of your work on a flash drive, the cloud or other storage (try <a href="Google documents">Google documents</a> or Microsoft OneDrive in <a href="https://myapps.microsoft.com">https://myapps.microsoft.com</a> Be sure to bookmark the URL for Canvas in case the Napa Valley College website goes down.

## **Response Papers** (see example in Canvas)

You will be asked to submit frequent (once a week), short (1 page typed) response papers during our reading *St. Martin's Guide* and *Anthropologist on Mars*. These papers should NOT be a summary of what you read in our book even though they may bring up aspects of the reading; rather, they should be your <u>critical response</u> to what you're reading (what surprises you and why, questions that came up, an exploration of ideas that might interest you to write about, etc.) The best way to get into the flow of writing these short responses is to <u>annotate</u> while your read (either in the margins or on sticky notes) and simply put those thoughts and responses together into a cohesive few paragraphs right after you are finished with the reading. These papers must be typed and properly formatted according to MLA including standard 1" margins, double-spacing, name, date, class, and indentions (see the MLA Handbook).

Free Noodle Tools with your student account! Students today are most challenged by the enormous amount of material available via the web and databases, what/how to use sources with their research paper and how to properly cite those sources in the essay itself. Keeping notes/records will help alleviate the panic students feel when it is time to use

research in an essay. While there are many functions of NoodleTools, three features that of most use are:

- 1. <u>citation</u> generator (MLA 8th ed., APA 6th ed., Chicago/Turabian 17th ed.)
- 2. <u>notecards</u> for taking notes on cited sources
- 3. sharing of working bibliographies with classmates or instructors.

## **Group Presentations**

Each student will be required to participate in one group presentation during the semester. Groups will decide which new information to present on any topic that emerges from our reading—as long as it is not repeating the same information. Creativity is encouraged. You may use any desktop or web program/site such as Powerpoint (in NVC myapps), Google Slides, Prezi, YouTube, Flickr, etc. Presentations should be about 5-10 minutes. Usually, a slide presentation is used for the online class. An example may be a group presentation that includes showing the class how one person's "disability" can also be creative genius.

#### **Individual Presentations**

At the end of the semester, each student will upload an individual presentation describing what he/she is writing about for his/her final research paper. As with the group presentations, a short slideshow is usually the format used by students, but you may want to try other software.
